Celebrating Academic Excellence



In March we held our annual Celebration of Academic Excellence. The formal assembly recognised the highest achievers for our Year 11 students in the Brigadier's Diploma and our Year 12 students in NCEA Level Two.

Brigadier's Diploma 2025

The Brigadier's Diploma is constructed in levels, to acknowledge that at Year 11, many students are still working out what they want to achieve academically, and that this growth can take some time. We have used the metaphor of a Tōtara Tree to represent the stages of achievement. Our beginning diploma, our Kākano is a seed, the beginning of growth, our proficient Diploma, our Mātātīpu is beginning to sprout and our Advanced Diploma, our Kōhure, our sapling is growing and changing.

The two Diplomas awarded in front of the Senior School were our Māhuri Tōtara, our outstanding awards and our Tōtara Pounamu awards, the premier award and pinnacle of achievement. Our Brigadier's Diploma provides the framework against which students are assessed in Year 11. It maintains and protects academic rigour, while incorporating wider holistic educational goals. Students earned consistently high academic grades across the curriculum, they have also kept their Hargest Way Grades for Effort and Respect at the highest levels across all classes and their attendance statistics are superb.

Navigating the Future:

A Community Update on Artificial Intelligence

As we continue to prepare our students for a rapidly changing world, the role of Artificial Intelligence (A.I.) has become part of our teaching and learning at Hēmi Hakena.

In 2025, a small staff team began leading and co-ordinating JHC's response to the ongoing challenge of how to manage the rapid development of AI technology, with Miss Laura Turner as the Teacher in Charge. In Term Four we surveyed our students and staff to better understand how they are interacting with these tools and the challenges our community is facing.

What Our Students Are Telling Us

While many students are curious and exploring A.I., two main themes emerged that require our collective attention:

The Authenticity Gap:

Some students, particularly between Year 7 - 10, are struggling to distinguish between using A.I. as a "tutor" to help them learn and instead use it to generate work that they then present as their own.

The Confidence Trap:

A significant number of students are unaware that A.I. can frequently be incorrect. This was most evident between Year 7 - 10. Because A.I. writes with such authority, students often take its "hallucinations" (made-up facts) as truth without cross-checking sources.

Our School Policy: The Traffic Light System

To help students navigate the use of A.I. in assessments we introduced an A.I. Traffic Light System in 2025. This helps give our students guidance into when it is appropriate to use A.I. for classwork. This has been beneficial for our Year 12 - 13 students sitting NCEA assessments, but will be used more widely across the school in 2026.

No A.I. use permitted for this task.

A.I. can be used for brainstorming or structuring, but the final output must be the student's own words and all A.I. use must be cited.

A.I. tools are encouraged to enhance the final product.

A.I. and the Developing Brain

While A.I. is an incredible tool for efficiency, we must be mindful of its impact on young brains. Adolescence is a critical period for developing “cognitive muscle.”

When students rely on A.I. to do the heavy lifting of summarising, analysing, or writing, they skip the “productive struggle” that builds critical thinking, memory, and problem-solving skills. Just as a physical muscle needs resistance to grow, a brain needs to do the hard work of thinking to develop the neural pathways required for higher-level learning.

How You Can Help at Home

We want our students to be “A.I. literate,” not “A.I. dependent.” Here is how you can support your child with their homework and schoolwork:

Ask to see the prompt:

If they are using A.I., ask them what they asked the tool. Encourage them to use it for explanations (e.g., “Explain the Water Cycle to a 13-year-old”) rather than for writing the essay.

Fact-Check Together:

If they get information from an A.I., challenge them to find a reliable website or book that confirms it.

Focus on the “Draft”

Encourage them to write their first draft without any tech, using A.I. only at the end to help check for grammar or to suggest ways to make a sentence clearer.

Data/Privacy:

We strongly recommend that if students are using A.I., they only use Gemini while signed into their school Google account. Our school-managed accounts provide a “walled garden” of privacy: student data is not used to train A.I. models, is not human-reviewed, and is not shared with third parties.

Our JHC Authenticity Policy remains clear: work submitted for assessment must be the student’s own. For NCEA and internal credits, presenting A.I.generated content as original work is considered a breach of assessment rules and can have serious consequences.

Our staff are committed to model ethical A.I. use and ensure that all communications reflect their authentic voice.
